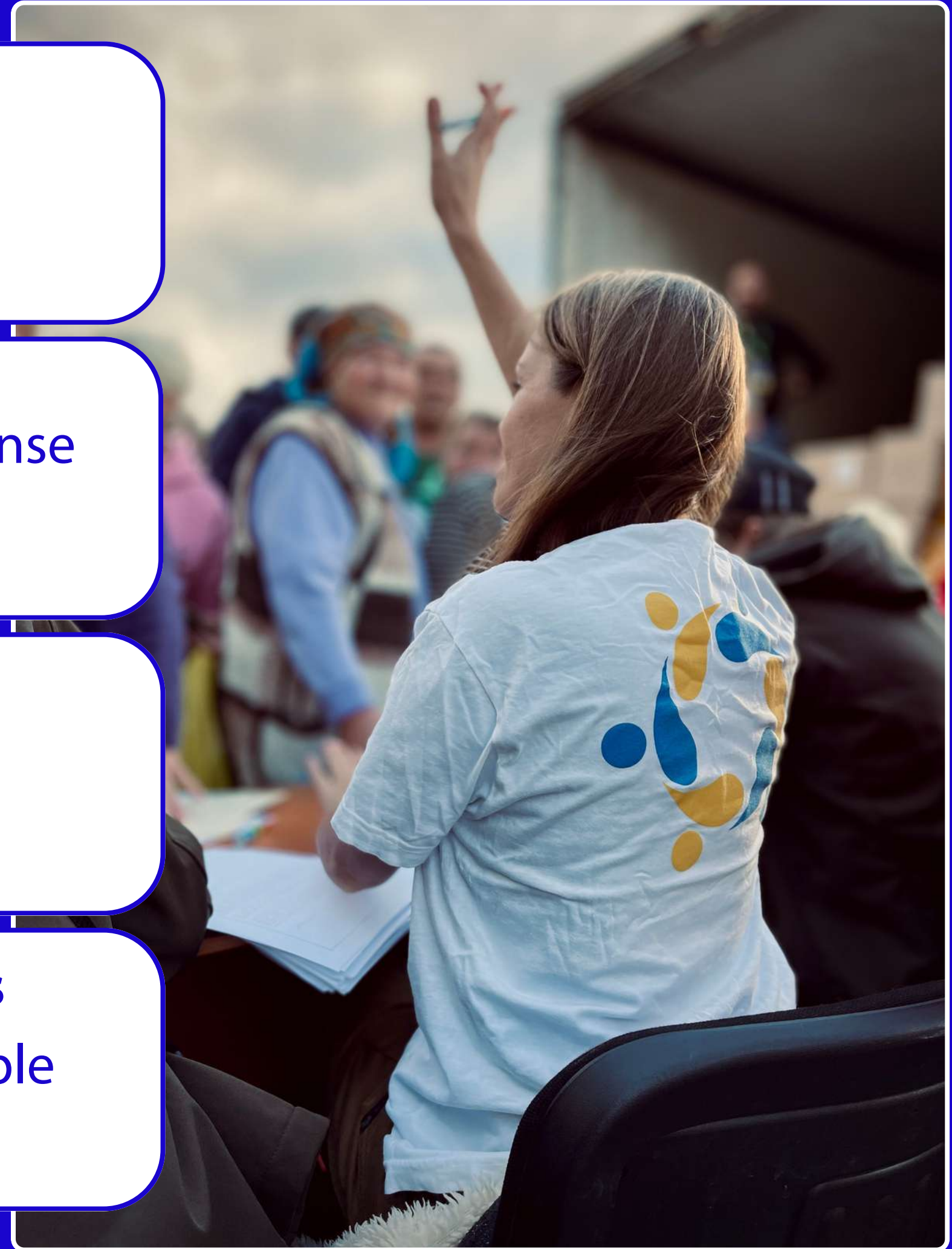

**Organization:**

Charitable Organization “Charitable Foundation “New Dawn”

**Area of Activity:**

Provision of humanitarian assistance to the population of Ukraine affected by the armed aggression.

**Target Audience:**

Internally displaced persons (IDPs), affected communities, host communities, returnees, and vulnerable groups of the population.

**Strategic Goal:**

To become a leader in providing humanitarian assistance by implementing effective, transparent, and targeted support programs for the population affected by the war.

Areas of activities of New Dawn

- **Support for Internally Displaced Persons in Odesa**

Since 2022, the foundation has operated an assistance center for IDPs in Odesa. Here, people received humanitarian aid, clothing, household items, consultations, and the opportunity to adapt to new living conditions, finding a safe space for communication and mutual support.

- **Humanitarian Aid in Frontline Communities**

Our teams delivered food and hygiene kits to villages in Mykolaiv and Kherson states. The assistance was directed to families who, due to their proximity to active hostilities, were in especially urgent need of basic necessities.

- **Mine Safety Training for Children**

To protect the lives and health of the younger generation, we conducted mine safety sessions in communities. Children learned how to behave when encountering dangerous objects and gained knowledge that could save lives.

- **Restoration of Damaged Homes**

The foundation provided construction materials to families whose homes were damaged by shelling. Thanks to this support, people were able to repair their houses, return to their native walls, and restore normal living conditions.

Areas of activities of New Dawn

- **Installation of Modular Medical Centers**

To ensure access to medical services in communities where hospitals and outpatient clinics have been destroyed, we installed modular medical facilities. This allowed residents to receive necessary healthcare without having to make long trips to distant cities.

- **WASH Assistance for Affected Communities**

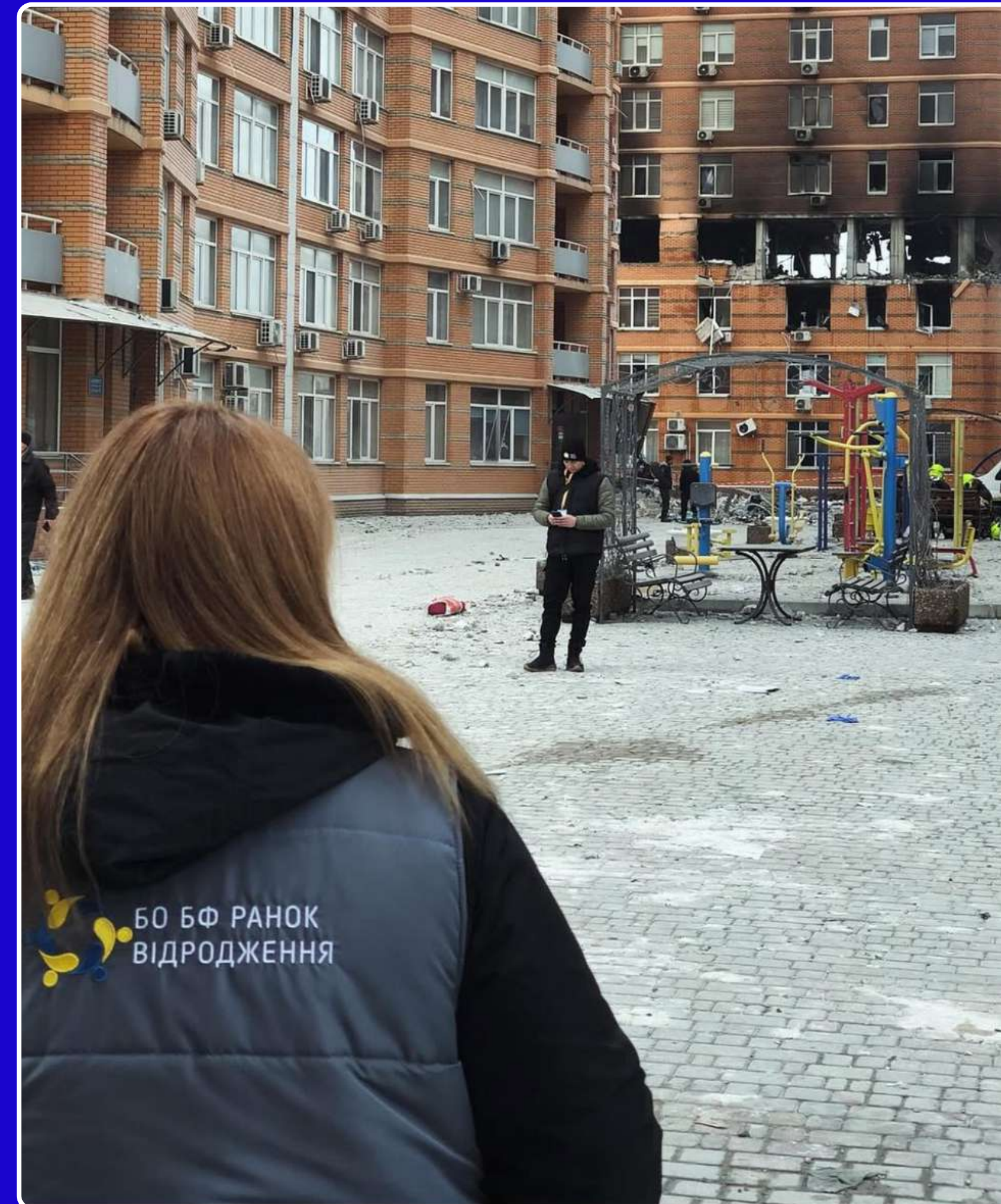
The foundation provides materials for repairing damaged water supply systems. This helps meet the basic needs of people who have lost access to safe water or have only limited availability of water resources.

- **Restoration of Critical Infrastructure**

The foundation is engaged in the repair and reconstruction of vital municipal and social infrastructure: hospitals, schools, social facilities, roads, water supply and sewage systems, and more in areas damaged by hostilities. This ensures the return of essential services to communities.

- **Drilling Wells and Installing Rozhnovsky Towers in Flooded Communities**

In areas where high groundwater levels, flooding, or disrupted drainage, caused by the Kakhovka HPP disaster, created severe problems, the foundation carries out well drilling and installation of new Rozhnovsky water towers to provide drinking water to affected villages and settlements.



For us, it is extremely important to be part of the humanitarian coordination system, as this allows us to direct resources effectively and avoid duplication of efforts.

We are active participants in the UN clusters, in particular:

In addition to international engagement, we constantly cooperate with local authorities and communities to ensure that humanitarian assistance meets the real needs of people. For us, coordination is not only a technical process but also a shared responsibility to make sure that every family in crisis receives timely and comprehensive support.

We actively cooperate with **communities**, supporting them in a wide variety of areas. For us, it is important not only to provide humanitarian aid but also to assist local authorities and utility companies in overcoming daily technical challenges. This includes advisory support, provision of necessary resources, and joint work on restoring infrastructure.

Strengthening Self-Reliance of IDPs, Returnees and Local Communities through an Integrated Emergency Shelter, WASH and FSL Approach in Southern Ukraine

Objective:

- Provide construction materials for housing repairs.
- Conduct mine safety trainings for 12,000 people.
- Supply 2,000 households with agricultural tools and inputs.
- Distribute hygiene and food kits to the population.

Results:

- Improved housing conditions.
- Increased awareness of mine safety.
- Budget reallocated from food kits to agricultural livelihood support.

Good Practices:

- Adjusting activities according to beneficiary needs (shifting from kit distributions to agricultural equipment).

Lessons Learned:

- The importance of considering potential changes in needs already at the planning stage.

1 October 2023 – 30 May 2024

Title:

Meeting the Basic Needs of IDPs and the Population of Odesa, Mykolaiv, and Kherson states

Objective:

Assist in the areas of food, hygiene, and livelihood support.

Results:

120,000 people received hygiene, food, and agricultural assistance.

Good Practices:

Regular adjustment of target groups depending on changing needs (e.g., support to families that lost a breadwinner).

Lessons Learned:

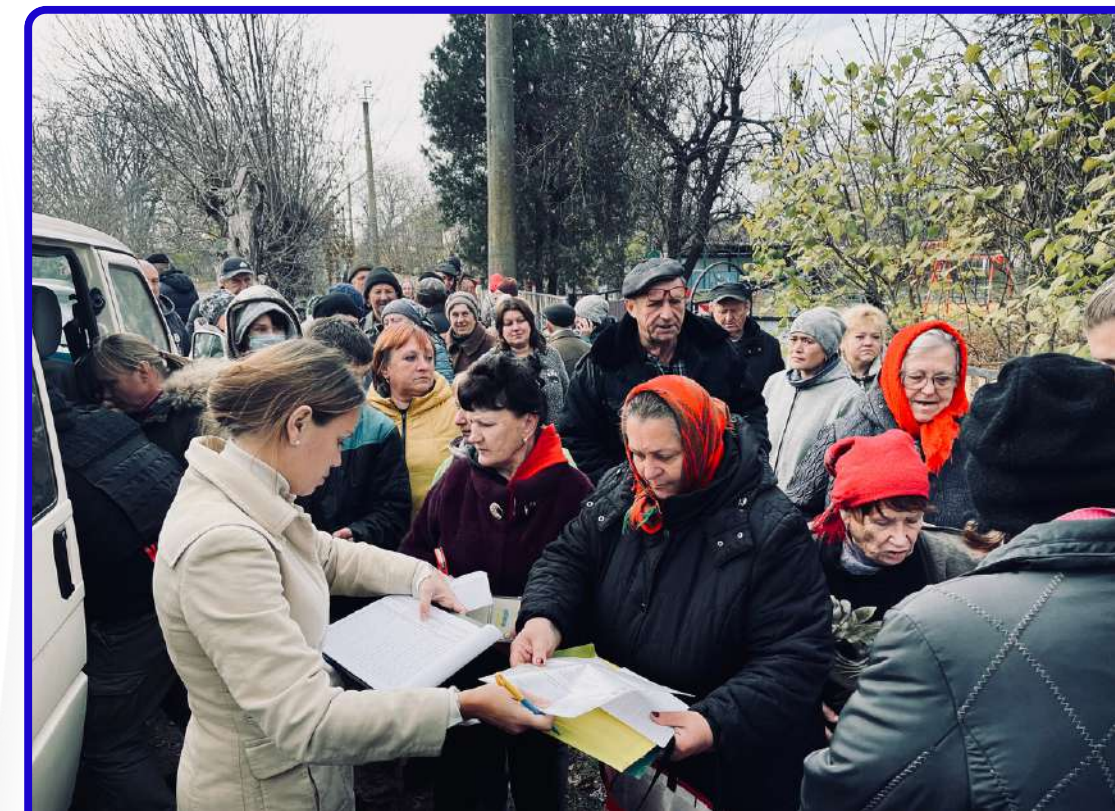
Use of a CRM system to analyze the dynamics of needs.

Duration:

1 October 2023 – 31 December 2024

Budget:

€1,830,000 + €4,700,000 in-kind





In the first years of the war, we met hundreds of children across different communities. Each of them came to us with their own story - a story of loss, forced displacement, new challenges, and hope. We saw their eyes, filled with both fear and, at the same time, a strength that amazes with its resilience.



Our programs have reached thousands of families - from distributing food and hygiene kits to conducting mine safety trainings. Yet behind all the numbers and reports, what has always remained most important for us is the person. Every child we have met is priceless, and each of their stories forever becomes part of our shared memory and responsibility.

Title:

Improve Living Conditions of IDPs in Zakarpatska Oblast and Respond to Winterization Needs of Civilians in Frontline and De-Occupied Areas in Kherson and Mykolaiv states, Ukraine

Objective:

Provide humanitarian assistance to war-affected communities and respond to emergencies, including the Kakhovka HPP disaster.

Results:

- Distributed hygiene, kitchen, and bedding kits.
- Procured two Bobcat mini-loaders for evacuation and debris clearance.
- Purchased 10 large water tanks to stabilize access to drinking water.

Good Practices:

Effective emergency response is enabled by pre-developed action algorithms.

Lessons Learned:

The necessity of a contingency fund for urgent needs.

Duration:

15 June 2023 – 30 November 2023

Budget:

€295,570.00

Title:

Provision of Critical, Life-Saving Winterization Support in Kherson state, Ukraine

Objective:

Address the urgent winter needs of vulnerable population groups in Kherson and Mykolaiv states.

Results:

- Supported 9,853 beneficiaries.
- Provided coal (2 tons per household).
- Insulated housing (installed windows in 563 households).
- Distributed 4,000 winter clothing kits.
- Conducted training on the prevention of sexual exploitation.

Good Practices:

- Use of tender procedures to ensure transparency in procurement.
- Risk analysis related to the security situation.

Lessons Learned:

- Systematic monitoring to evaluate the effectiveness of activities.
- Continuous security risk analysis.

Duration:

1 October 2024 – 30 May 2025

Budget:

USD 1,481,526.01

Title:

Essential Humanitarian Assistance to Vulnerable People in Frontline Gromadas

Objective:

Address urgent shelter and WASH needs of IDPs, returnees, and host communities in frontline coastal areas of Kherson state.

Results:

- Restored access to water supply through three boreholes.
- Distributed repair kits to 359 households.

Good Practices:

Collaboration with UNICEF to provide solar-powered energy solutions.

Lessons Learned:

Incorporating security risk considerations during implementation.

Duration:

1 April 2024 – 30 September 2024

Budget:

USD 244,197

Title:

Improving Living Conditions and Basic Livelihoods

Objective:

Ensure the basic needs of the population.

Results:

- 25,000 people received winter and hygiene kits.
- Restored access to drinking water.

Good Practices:

Maintaining “backup” activities to respond to changing needs.

Lessons Learned:

Incorporating security risk considerations during implementation.

Duration:

1 April 2024 – 31 December 2024

Budget:

€195,362

Objective:

Ensure water supply for communities in Kherson state.

Results:

- Installation of a borehole in Myrolyubivka village.
- Installation of a water tower in Ivanivka village.

Good Practices:

- Engaging local contractors to carry out the work.
- Installing energy-efficient equipment to reduce operating costs.

Lessons Learned:

The need to account for potential difficulties with electricity grid connections, which may affect implementation timelines.

Duration:

12 September 2024 – 15 January 2025

Budget:

€74,464

Title:

Improving Housing Conditions and Access to Medical Services in Kherson state

Objective:

Enhance the quality of life of war-affected households through housing insulation and the provision of access to basic healthcare.

Results:

- Insulated 179 households through the distribution of fuel briquettes.
- Installed a 21 m² modular medical center in Novokamyanka village, serving up to 400 people per month.

Good Practices:

- Ensuring transparency by monitoring each stage of aid distribution.
- Using data from local administrations to verify beneficiaries.

Lessons Learned:

The need to consider material delivery timelines in advance to maintain the implementation schedule.

Duration:

1 October 2024 – 31 January 2025

Budget:

€117,808

Title:

Winter Support with Stoves and Solid Fuel for Residents of Kherson state

Objective:

Provide the population with fuel materials for the winter season.

Results:

Improved winter living conditions in vulnerable communities.

Duration:

12 September 2024 – 15 December 2024

Budget:

USD 47,689

Objective:

Ensure access to healthcare and repair schools in war-affected communities.

Results:

- Established 4 medical centers.
- Repaired 5 schools and 1 hospital.

Good Practices:

- Use of modular structures for rapid deployment of medical facilities.
- Involvement of local contractors in repair works.

Lessons Learned:

The need to account for logistical challenges in conflict-affected areas.

Duration:

15 April 2023 – ongoing

Budget:

USD 134,090

Title:

Ensuring Access to Medical Services and Distribution of Food and Hygiene Kits in Frontline Villages

Objective:

Improve access of the population in frontline villages to basic medical services and provide essential food and hygiene items.

Results:

- Established 1 primary healthcare point (FAP).
- Distributed 1,066 hygiene kits.

Good Practices:

Mobilization of local resources and partnerships with communities to ensure effective delivery of aid to remote villages.

Lessons Learned:

The need to combine medical assistance with humanitarian kits to comprehensively address community needs.

Duration:

February 2023 – May 2023

Budget:

UAH 764,868.8



Project supported by Blindspots

Objective:

Provide frontline communities with firewood and supply 13 small generators for kindergartens.

Results:

- Improved living conditions for vulnerable populations in frontline areas.
- Increased energy autonomy of households.

Good Practices:

Use of locally available fuel resources and small generators for rapid stabilization of living conditions in crisis-affected communities.

Lessons Learned:

The need for early planning and consideration of logistical challenges when delivering firewood and generators to frontline settlements.

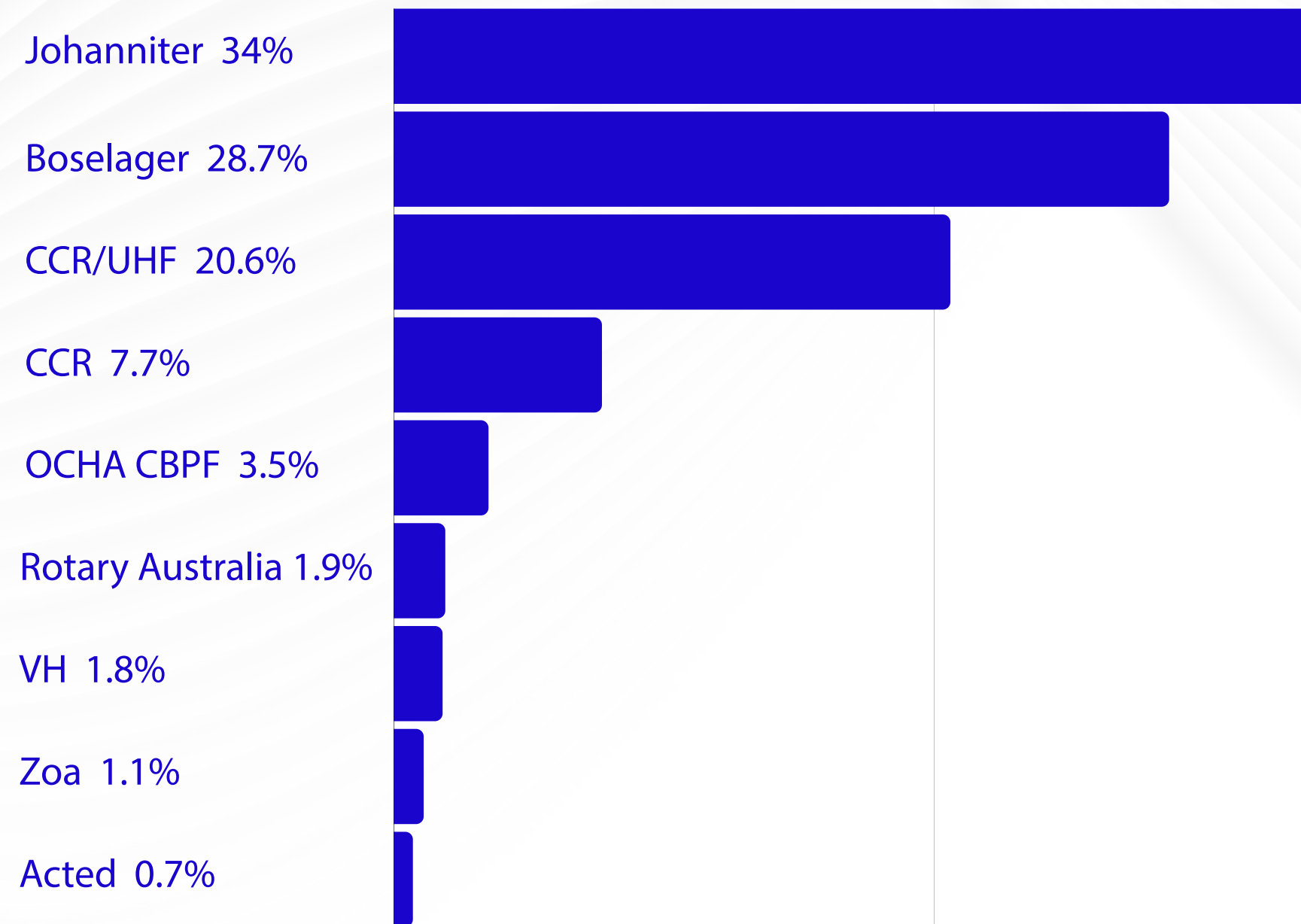

- Strengthen the resilience of affected communities.



New Dawn has opened its representation in Brussels at the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC).
